Edward L. Jacobus was born 1835 in NJ. He was named after his grandfather Edward Pearce of Fairfield NJ. Before the war, Edward was a horse harness maker in Napoleon Ohio.

He joined the Ohio 23rd Corps, 3rd Division,1st Brigade. **100th** regiment company B on 8/1862 in Toledo Ohio when age 27.

This is the <u>same</u> company and town as his cousin **Edward W**. **Pearce** age 22 of Napoleon Ohio.

Private Edward L. Jacobus died **4/2/**1863 in the Civil War at Lexington, Kentucky. (41 years later, his grandmother **Catharine Pearce Jacobus** died on **4/2** in 1904). Per Cherl Rogers in 2007, Edward (also known as Edwin) died of Lung Fever.

Edward left a 26 year old wife **Mary E. Thorn**. They were married **5 years** earlier on 10/24/1857 in Napoleon. He left 3 young Jacobus children ages 2 to 4: Frank S. born 10/23/1858, John H. born 1860 and Clara Elizabeth born 3/1/1861.

Four years later on 11/3/1867, Mrs. Mary E. Thorn Jacobus married a good gentlemen Daniel Beaton Hartley who took on her 3 Jacobus children plus they would have 5 more children. Daniel had served in the Ohio 38th Infantry Company B, as a Corporal.

Edward Jacobus enlisted for service August 2, 1862 in Henry County, Ohio. The harness maker reported to Camp Toledo on September 1. A member of Company B of the 100th Infantry Regiment Ohio, he was detached for duty to the Quartermasters department on September 21. By the November muster roll, he had rejoined his company stationed in Kentucky, where their job was to protect the city of Cincinnati.

At the time of his enlistment, he and his wife, Mary Thorn Jacobus, had been married for not quite 5 years. They had three children, Frank, John and Clara, ages 4, 1 and 5 months respectively.

His death, which would be reported in Edward's pension files by his Captain, H.D. Taylor, would come almost 8 months to the day after his enlistment.

"E. Jacobus was a private in my said company and that on or about the 20th day of February, 1863, at or near Lexington, Kentucky,

Taylor further went on to state:

"I was present with my company during the time he was sick in hospital and visited him frequently, and I saw him the day before he died and my first Lt. G.D. Forsyth saw him after he was dead and reported the fact to me."

The body would not be shipped back to Henry County, but instead, be interred at what was to become Lexington National Cemetery. Edward was 27 years old.

The error of the missing "u" was foreshadowed earlier, in the muster roll taken for September and October 1862. A hurried hand wrote, "Edward L. Jacobs."

Certainly, Captain Taylor knew the correct last name as indicated in his statement in Edward's pension file, but the clerk who filled out the casualty sheet, probably did not. The casualty sheet read Jacobs, and officially, when the markers were ordered for the graves at Lexington National Cemetery, my gg grandfather became for all intents, Edward L. Jacobs.



Mrs. Mary E. Thorn Jacobus would 1867 remarry 4 years after Edward died. The 2nd husband was Daniel Beaton Hartley who also lived in Napoleon Ohio and was the same age 31 as Mary.

Dan had served in the Union Army Ohio 38th Infantry company B as a Corporal.

Mary brought 3 young children into the Hartley marriage ages 9, 7, 6. The middle child John would die 3 years later age 10.

Mary had 5 children with Dan.

Mary died 1904 age 67.

Dan died 7 years later.


Both husbands had seen Civil War destruction. Dan and Mary made the best of things, raising 8 children. They can't be forgotten.

Frank became an Napoleon, Henry county, Ohio farmer. He moved North at some point to Tiffin, Seneca county, Ohio. Frank is buried at Fairmont Cemetery, Tiffin, Ohio. Grave site Section D, Row 3&4, Gr 80.

Frank was a cousin in the same 1800s 5th generation as Glen's, Charles Small Pierce of NJ.
