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They married **12/29/1878** at the Fairfield Methodist Church, Fairfield, Essex County, NJ.

Their home was to the left of the cemetery, maybe 80 feet back into those woods and about 30 feet from the road. The house burned down around 1975.

Per Tues **9/6/1910** Newark Advertiser newspaper, page 9 :

“Mr. and Mrs. Albert Pierce and Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert Van Ness of Caldwell Township (Fairfield) are spending a week at Split Rock pond.” Mrs. Van Ness is our **Mary Louise Pierce**, sister to Albert Pierce. The pond is at Rockaway, NJ. People hiked and fished at this pond.

Gilbert was the 1930s Treasurer for Hillside Cemetery.

Gilbert worked as a Carpenter in 1880.

Gilbert [worked 1890's-1906 at the Francisco Fairfield Dairy Farm](#) which is now the Fairfield Airport. There were 200 to 300 cows. Gilbert was a manager.

In 3/1926, the Company sold their herd of 300 cows. An airport was built on the site.

## **350 CHICKENS DESTROYED IN FIRE IN FAIRFIELD**

Three hundred and fifty young chickens were destroyed in a fire of unknown origin that occurred late yesterday afternoon on the farm of Gilbert Van Ness, of Fairfield. There was no one at home at the time. Thomas Pier, a neighbor, saw smoke issuing from the brooder in which the chicks were kept, but by the time he reached the place it was totally destroyed.

On this date 5/14/1913, Gilbert was age 59 and Mary age 57.

The 1913 fire was a financial blow.

Gilbert and Mary were members of the Fairfield Dutch Reformed Church. Gilbert was an Elder.

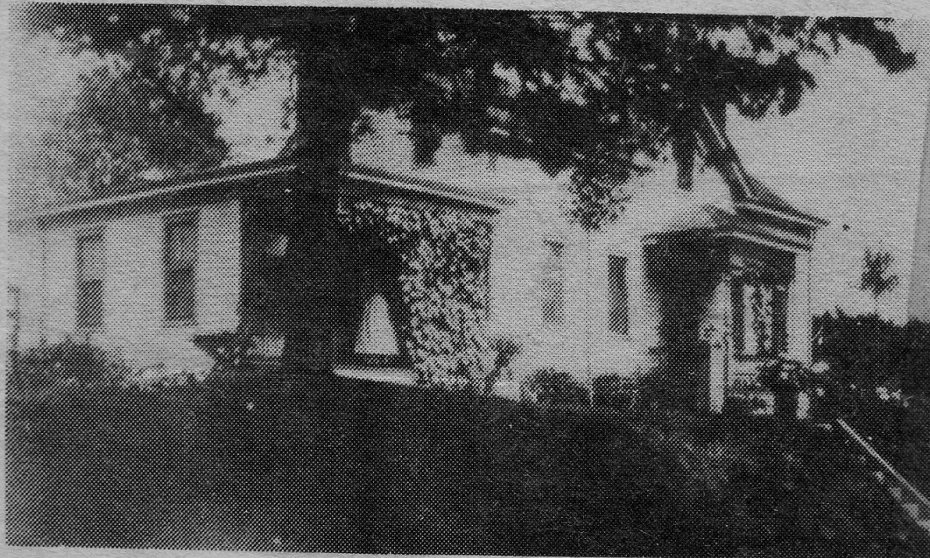

Van Ness; leacons, Cornelius Dey, Thomas Sanderson, Augustus Demarest and Wesley DeBaum; clerk of consistory, Lyman Demarest; superintendent of Sunday school, Cornelius Dey, jr.; organist, Miss Grace Dey.

**Pearce-Van Ness Homestead**

Shown above is the Pearce-Van Ness Homestead, probably most often referred to as the Gilbert Van Ness House, although the property was originally owned by Hans Pearce who was born in 1793.

Located at 100 Horseneck Road in Fairfield the property can not be seen today as clearly as it is in the above picture, because of the bushes and trees which have grown up in front of it.

The exact date of the

building's origin is not known, but it is thought to have been built in the early 1800's by Hans Pearce and the next owner was his son Henry H. Pearce.

Gilbert Van Ness and his wife Mary Louise Pearce lived here for many years and had two children born here, Joseph J. Van Ness and Bertha Van Ness Zeek.

The property then passed to Mrs. Van Etta, now deceased and is presently unoccupied.

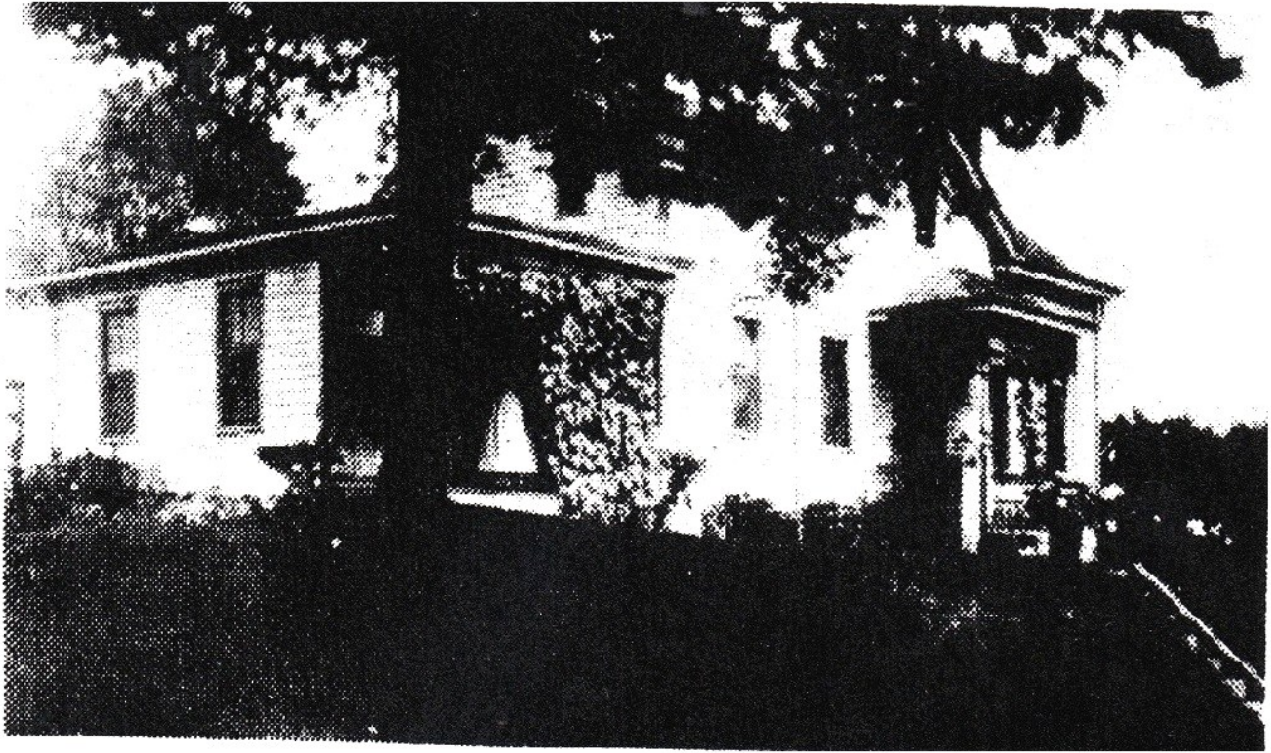

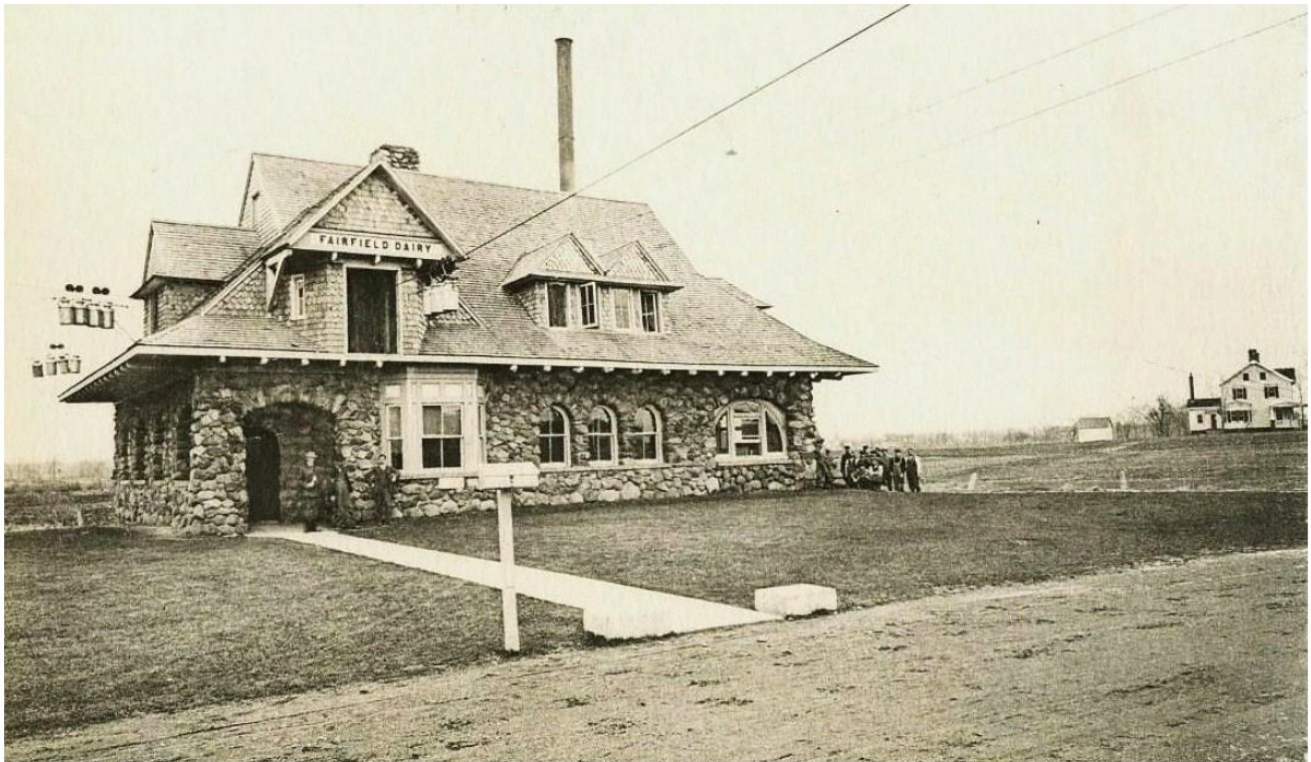

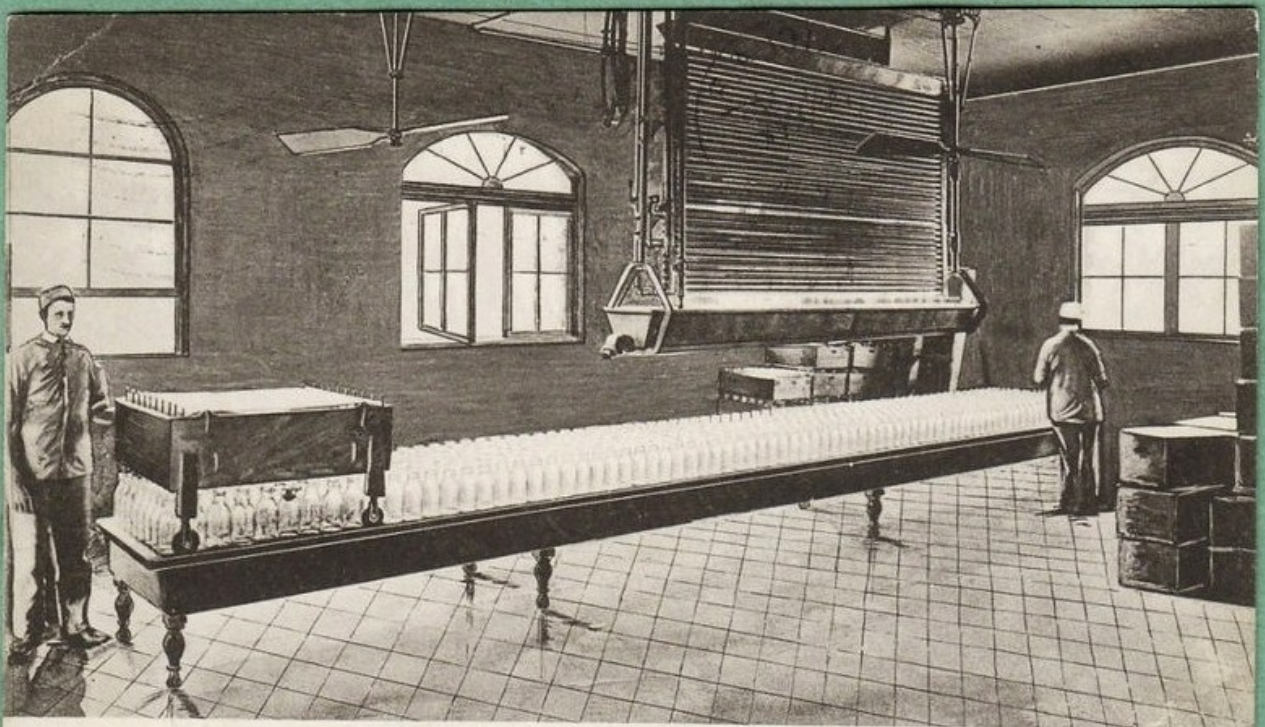

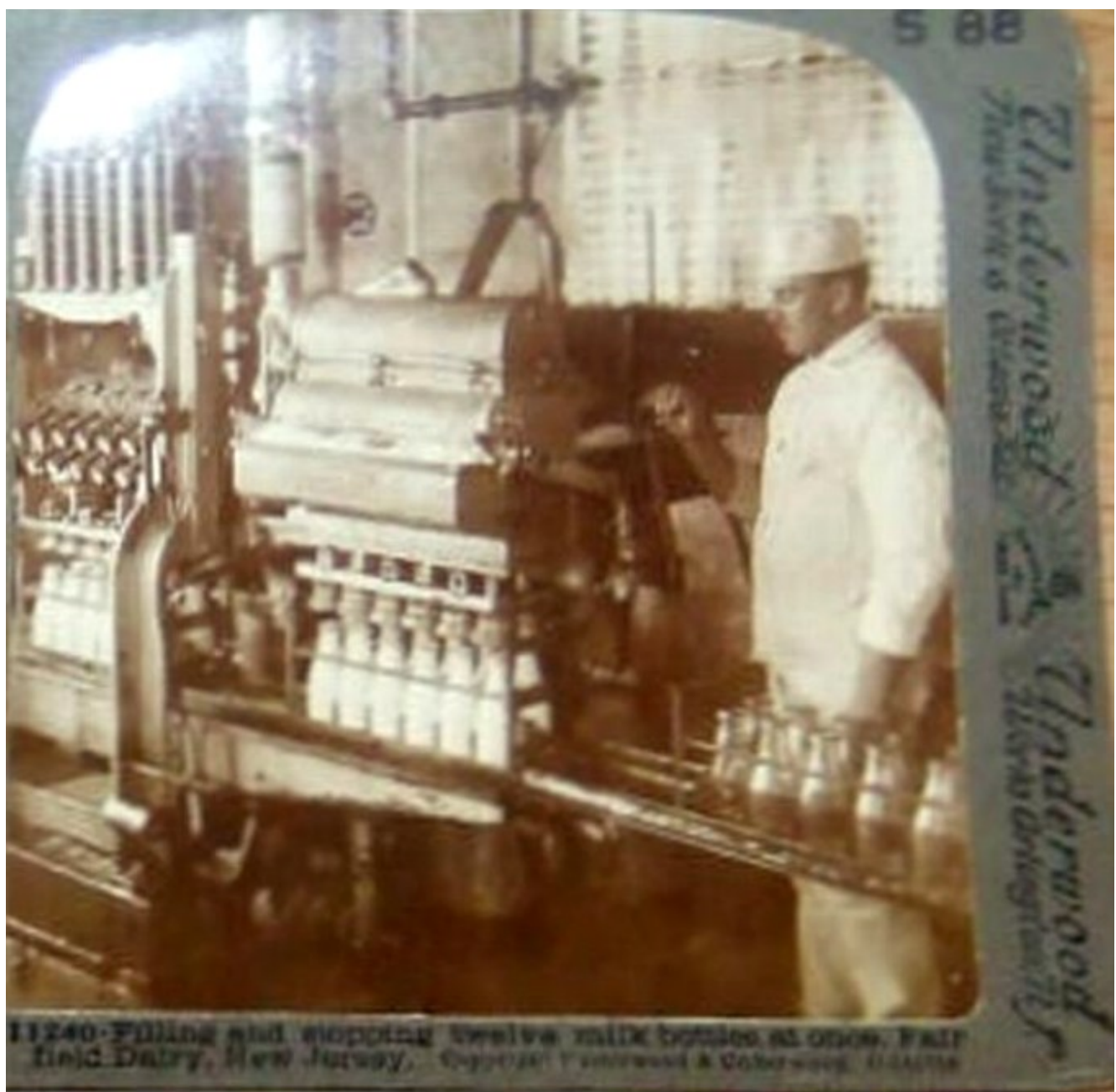

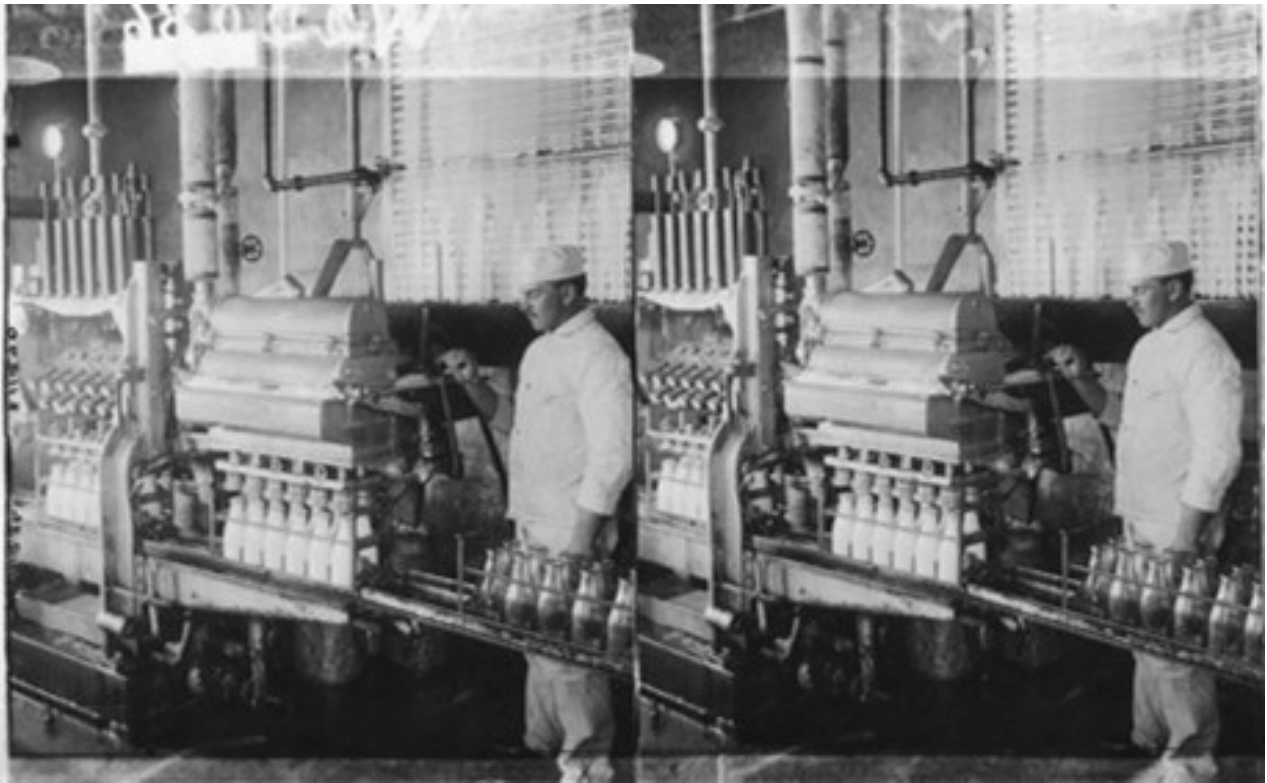


Milk bottle sterilization and filling operations for **4,000 quarts** of daily output.

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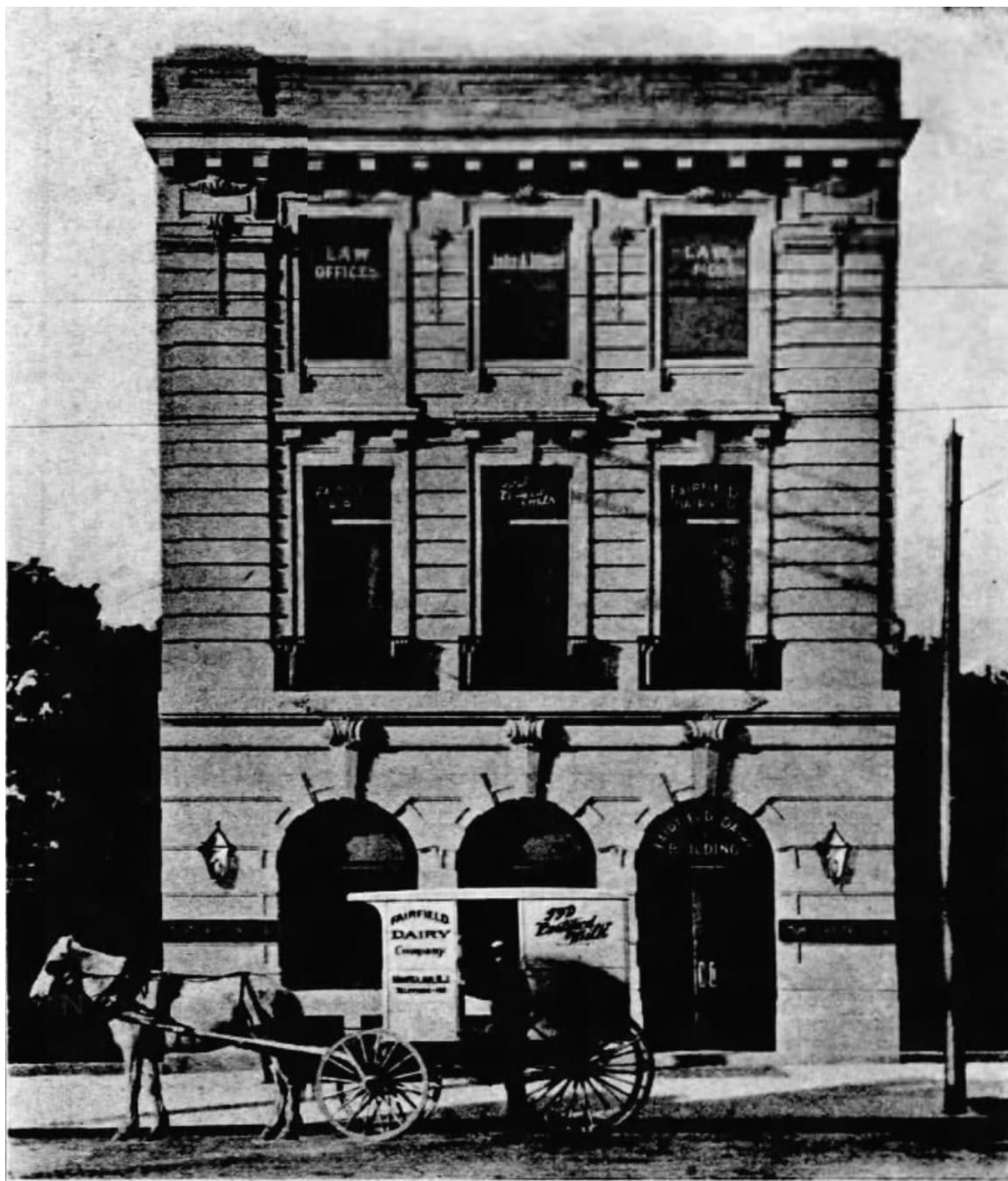

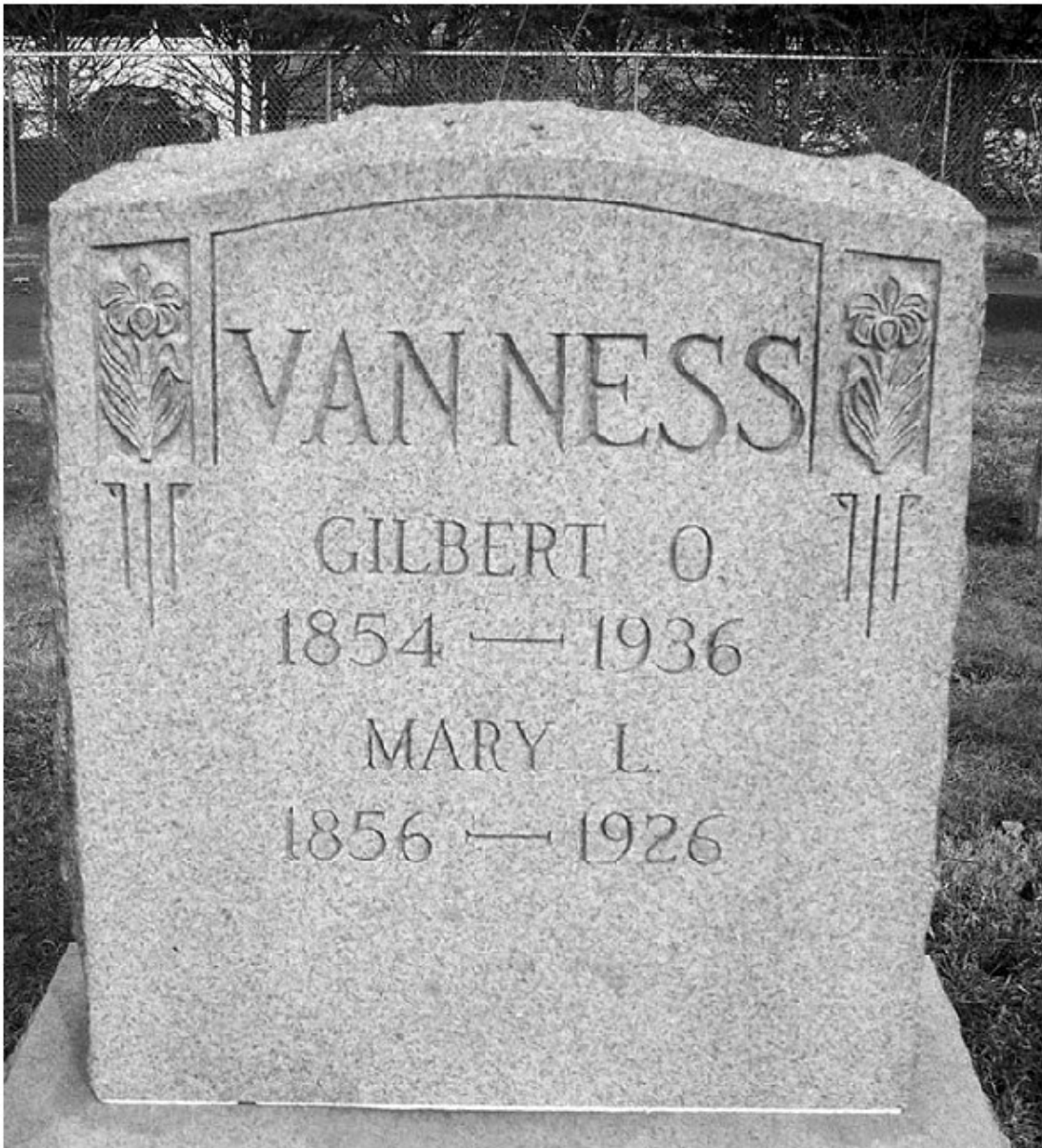




FAIRFIELD DAIRY BUILDING.
