





As a business man walked past the Woolworth building, in New York, yesterday afternoon he saw a varicolored cotton ball, about two inches in diameter, fall from the skies at his feet

"Queer sort of a thing for a kid to be playing with," he muttered as he passed on. He didn't know that the little ball of red, blue and yellow was a bomb thrown from an aeroplane, hardly discernible to the naked eye as it soared 4,000 feet above the pavements. Another thing that he did not know was that a very pretty girl was throwing 100 of these bombs, dropping some downtown and some as far north as Grant's Tomb on Riverside Drive, to show what a hostile sier could do to a defenceless city in a sudden air raid.

First Woman to Fly Over City.
The girl was Miss Vera Pearce, a motion picture actress, who had the distinction of being the first woman ever to fly over New York. It was her first trip in an acroplane at that.

Miss Pearce is a daughter of Theo-Dore S. Pearce, formerly 129Linden avenue, Middletown, and she at one time resided here She went to Garden City yesterday with other "movie" folk and camera men. Tex Millman, instructor in avlation for the New York National Guardsmen at Garden City, was walting there for her with a military tractor biplane of the New Jersey Aeroplane Company type. She wore the regulation flying costume, olive drab coat and breeches, leather leggings and a woollen skull cap, all concealed under a long coat. At the field the threw off the coat, pulled a gunnysack full of bombs from the automobile and stepped into the observer's seat of the aeroplane.

Shortly before 4 o'clock Millman and Miss Pearce went up, circled about for a few minutes and then set out straight for the city. They reached Hell Gate a few minutes later and cut across the northern end of Central Park to Riverside Drive at an altitude of between 3,500 and 4,000 feet. Then the bombardment began There was a rather stift wind blowing and the cotton balls were carried in every direction.

Cameras Record Bombardment.

Down the Hudsor River they went and circled above the Statue of Liberty, then up the East River and over housetops as far as the Woolworth building. There more bombs were dropped, as a squad of motion picture camera men on the Whitehall building roof ground their cranks and took yards of film for the "movie" weeklies. Then back to Garden City they went after having been in the air less than an hour for the entire trip.

"It was wonderful," said Miss Pearce when she landed. "Afraid? Not a bit There wasn't anything to be afraid of—it was just like riding on a seesaw." And to prove it she annihilated a couple of sandwiches and a bottle of milk. "But I was just thinking," she went on, "what I could have done to poor old New York if they'd been real bombs."

Each of the 100 bombs thrown from the aeroplane had attached to it an

envelope containing two season passes to the Motion Picture Exhibition at the Grand Central Palace.

On the third time around, when she was about 2,000 feet above the imitation fort they were building for the flying exhibition. she made a swallow's smooth downward curve, then sheered up and back over her own path, her head and the upper part of her machine downward toward the ground. For a moment the engine stopped; then the tune of it began again. Katherine Stinson for the several hundredth time had looped the loop, and three minutes later she landed without even a jolt. She had been up less than ten minutes.

Miss Stinson wears no elaborate aviation wardrobe.

Ofter she doesn't even tuck her curls under her close fitting hood. She wears a short khaki skirt, high heeled boots and the two warmest coats she can find. Sometimes she wears riding breeches, but she doesn't in the least object to a skirt. She never allows wind or clouds to interfere with her flights. "But I don't like rain," she confessed. "It hurts. It feels exactly like sleet when you fly in it."

Besides looping the loop, she has carried United States mail, dropped bombs, made night flights, flown with her plane upside down and performed a number of other "stunts." "They always want some fancy thing thrown in at the exhibitions," she admitted carelessly.

"My sister Marjorie is only eighteen, and she's a flier. My brother Edwin is twenty-three, and he flies. In San Antonio, Tex., we three are running the Stinson school of aviation. I have another brother fifteen years old, but he wants to go to West Point. My people on both sides fought in the civil war.




President Wilson and the House declared war, 373 to 50, on Germany on **4/6/1917**, nearly 3 years after WW1 started.

Ruby daughter **Joan Herzer** married Don Miller Sr., had a child Don Jr. who graduated 1965 West Essex High School with Glen Pierce. I remember Don asking me if we were related but since my last-name spelling was different, we did not figure this out. I lost track of Don who died 2004. He was super smart in HS. Was our baseball statistician while I played on the team.



PHIL BAKER was born in New York City, where he received his schooling. Early in life he became intrigued by the accordion and found that painstaking practice made it possible to coax real melody from this seemingly unpromising instrument. He has carried his studies to the point of having successfully adapted a number of Beethoven's works to its supposed limitations. Mr. Baker entered vaudeville as partner of Ben Bernie, and for a number of years the act of "Bernie and Baker" was a welcomed headliner. At that time he confined himself to the accordion and to being a "feeder" or straight character man for Mr. Bernie, the comedian of the act. His own keen sense of comedy was a later development. On the legitimate stage his debut was made on the Ziegfeld Roof. This was followed by an engagement on the Century Roof. He has since been seen in "The Music Box Revue." the second edition of "The Greenwich Village Follies," three editions of "Artists and Models," "A Night in Spain," "Gay Paree" and "Pleasure Bound."

GEORGE HASSELL was born in Birmingham and was graduated from Malvern College, England. He had determined upon a military career and enlisted in the British Army, but soon wearied of the life. His second love had always been the stage and, in 1900, he made his debut in "The Ladder of Life," Melbourne, Australia. His first appearance in New York was in "Her Own Money," which was followed by roles in "Rachel," "Rule of Three" and "The Tempest." His principal appearances in musical productions have been in "The High Cost of Loving," "The Student Prince," "Countess Maritza" and "The Circus Princess." Mr. Hassell's greatest desire is to win a nice motorboat in a two-dollar raffle and then inherit sufficient money to be able to retire and run the boat.

AILEEN STANLEY was born in Chicago, Ill., of English ancestry, her parents having come to America shortly before her birth. She received her education in grammar and high schools in her native town. Her theatrical career began in vaudeville with a brother, the act rising to a headline position under the name "Aileen and Stanley." After nine years in the twoa-day, she went to London to star at the Kit-Kat Club with such success that she appeared at a command performance before King George and as a guest of the Prince of Wales at a number of receptions. With a repertoire of over 500 songs, Miss Stanley holds a record in the sale of phonograph discs. over twenty-five million copies having been sold. In the realm of sport she has acquired a notable collection of swimming trophies. Her most recent appearance in New York was in "Pleasure Bound."

HALFRED YOUNG was born in Kansas City, Mo. In 1924 he won a scholarship and studied in the opera department of a Rochester, N. Y., school. Following a year there, he made his debut as Detlef in "The Student Prince," Chicago — summer of 1925 — afterwards playing the name role. His bow to New York was made in "The Great Temptations," opening at the Winter Garden, May 18, 1926. The Messrs. Shubert have made an entertainment that began life as a musical comedy into a revue with a trifle of plot and called it "Artists and Models." Of this perennial revue it is described as the "Paris-Riviera Edition of 1930." Watson Barratt has designed pretty Riviera settings. The best things in it are Phil Baker, the man who answers him back from a box, and "The Rumba," a dance attributed to Havana and accompanied by the seductive garglings of the Havana Cubanola Rumba Band.

Of course, "Artists and Models, Paris-Riviera Edition of 1930," has girls—lots of them; pretty ones. They appear at intervals in their cute little shirts and at intervals without their shirts. It was "Artists and Models," you remember, that first glorified the American girl with

and Models" is intended as a summer show, and a successful summer show it seems certain to be.

It has nothing in it that can be called superlative, much that ought to be flattered to hear self described as mediocre. It is just a "show," no attempt being made to surpass anything else, merely an effort to get together a sufficiently varied assortment of the usual things that can be relied on to attract the kind of crowd that fills New York in the summer.

Halfred Young is seen as a titled young art student somewhere along the Mediterranean who agrees to marry blond Mary Adams, who is the daughter of the large man full of funny faces, played by George Hassell, for \$5,000. The two young people have never seen each other before and the agreement is that they are to separate the moment the wedding is over. But they happen to meet before the wedding and fall in love and then the boy gets sore after the wedding because he has married for money and decides to spend it on his fellow students in the cafe where the chorus girls do the Rumba, after Phil Baker has sung a song about the attractions of Havana.

That is as much of the plot as it is necessary to mention. The rest is revue. The plot is not interesting nor the comedy funny. Mary Adams is pretty and can dance.


The story suffers many happy interruptions which make "Artists and Models" a revue. Wesley Pierce and Hazel Harris, for instance, dance, displaying several new acrobatic stunts. There is a scene in a solatium for ladies only in which George Hassell and another comedian, finding themselves among chorus girls who haven't much on, have to dress as women in order to avoid detection. (A number of the chorus girls, by the way, are extraordinarily toothsome.)

Phil Baker, with his accordion, and his assistant, to whom he gives his best jokes, appear two or three times. Mr. Baker's jokes are dirtier than usual. Miss Florence, who hails from the Folies Bergere in Paris, dances. And the program bears the names of the graceful Rath Brothers.



Edwardian Fashion – The Gibson Girl

The Gibson Girl – became the first 20th century standard of female beauty and style, named after Charles Dana Gibson, a Life Magazine illustrator whose fanciful illustrations inadvertently created a new idealized style of Edwardian Fashion. American women in particular, tried to emulate this look through the early Edwardian era up to the beginning of the First World War.

The Gibson Girl was defined as an emancipated post Victorian era woman, who wore daringly tight corsets to create an hourglass figure. She wore her hair long, and pulled it back into an updo bouffant or pompadour style.






The 1904 Charles Dana Gibson House. No. 127 East 73rd Street. 2012 Photo New York, NY

In **August 1979**, my girl friend knew a group of NYC theatre friends who put on backyard plays in Sparta NJ. Vera Pearce's birthday was August 27; she was being honored by her nephew who lived at the Sparta home.

We drove route 80 West to route 15 North. The home was off a main road, hidden by woods and tall yellow grass, accessed by a winding dirt road. It was an attractive rustic house possibly built in the 1920s.

There were about 18 people around the indoor buffet area that had a long table. The friendly male host grilled my about my last name Pierce. He said the home use to belong to his actress Aunt Vera Pearce. He said that Vera came from Middletown NY. I had no clue.

After dinner, the NYC actresses put on a backyard show.

The outdoor platform, 12x16 and 1 foot high, had dangling ropes for floating Shakespearian characters. When a scene finished, the NYC actor/actresses would plop to the ground. It was mysteriously dark outside with some low lights. We 12 or so audience members watch the serious acting.

I did not know anything about Vera for another 20 years.

I believe that I found the host around 2021, buried in Ocean County NJ.
