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My records say that Effingham Low (1745-1812) and wife Elsie Vreeland built this home in 1778. The homestead still stands in 2014 for \$700,000. The address is 102 Hook Mountain Road, Pine Brook NJ.

Effingham had served in the Revolutionary War. He is in the Pearce tree, a non blood relative, on the Edward Pearce—Hannah Stagg branch #3. Later, the name Berger was associated with the Low house.



The Low's had 5 daughters and 1 son. Effingham Low died 1812 when daughter Maria was age 4.

Sixteen years later, the daughter **Maria Low** (1810-1865) age 20 of Pine Brook NJ married our **Andrew Edward Pearce** (1806-1848) age 24 of Fairfield NJ.

Maria's father had died 18 years earlier. I do not know if her mother Elsie Vreeland Low was alive in 1830.

Andrew's parents Edward Pearce and Hannah Stagg would have attended the 6/16/1830 wedding. The church and wedding site are unknown.

From **1830 to 1837**, Andrew and Maria farmed in Montville NJ. By 1837, they had 3 children; **Josiah** 1/16/1831, **Joseph** 3/31/1834 and **Louise** Pearce 11/8/1835. I bet Andrew named his son Joseph after his younger brother Joseph, who is Glen's ancestor.

Grandfather Edward Pearce died 7/26/1834 in Fairfield NJ and had a chance to meet Josiah and Joseph.

Then came "the **1837 US Financial Panic** which developed into a major Depression until 1844. Profits, prices, and wages dropped, westward expansion stalled, unemployment rose, and pessimism abounded." (Wikipedia)

They had 2 more children in NJ: Unknown male 1838 who died shortly thereafter and **Edward W. Pearce** 6/1/1840 (named after the grandfather).

I assume that Maria's mom Mrs Elsie Vreeland Low died before 1841 after reviewing census records.

Andrew's mother Mrs Hannah Stagg Pearce wanted to stay in Fairfield NJ area with her other adult children.

With the **Depression** hurting the family, Andrew likely applied for a federal land grant known as "80-acres". Andrew, Maria and their 4 young children moved in **1841** to a **Napoleon Ohio** farm. Maria's 18 year old brother **Henry N. Low** travelled with them.



It was **time to say goodbye**. Low and Pearce relatives stopped by during the week to wish good luck to Andrew and Maria. I image the relatives realized that this would be the last time seeing them.

**Mrs. Hannah Stagg Pearce** age 63 was most affected since she stayed in Fairfield NJ. After her husband Edward died in 1834, Hannah lived with her son Joseph Pearce who was her 9th of 12 children. In 1841, Joseph was age 27, married two years to Nancy Jacobus. Hannah had other children living in the Fairfield NJ area. Hannah would die in 1846 at the age 68. Buried at Hillside Cemetery.

Some of Hannah's children had also moved away from Fairfield NJ.

Did they move in 1838? No.

**“In 1838 a whole party of Essex Co. residents moved by covered wagon to Ottawa County, Ohio.”** (1838 Newark Daily Advertiser; 2024 from Glenn G. Geisheimer)

I cannot find that article. Ottawa County is in upper Northwestern Ohio, not too far from Napoleon.

They could not have moved to Ohio in 1838. They had a son Edward W. Pearce born 6/1/1840 in Pequannock, NJ.

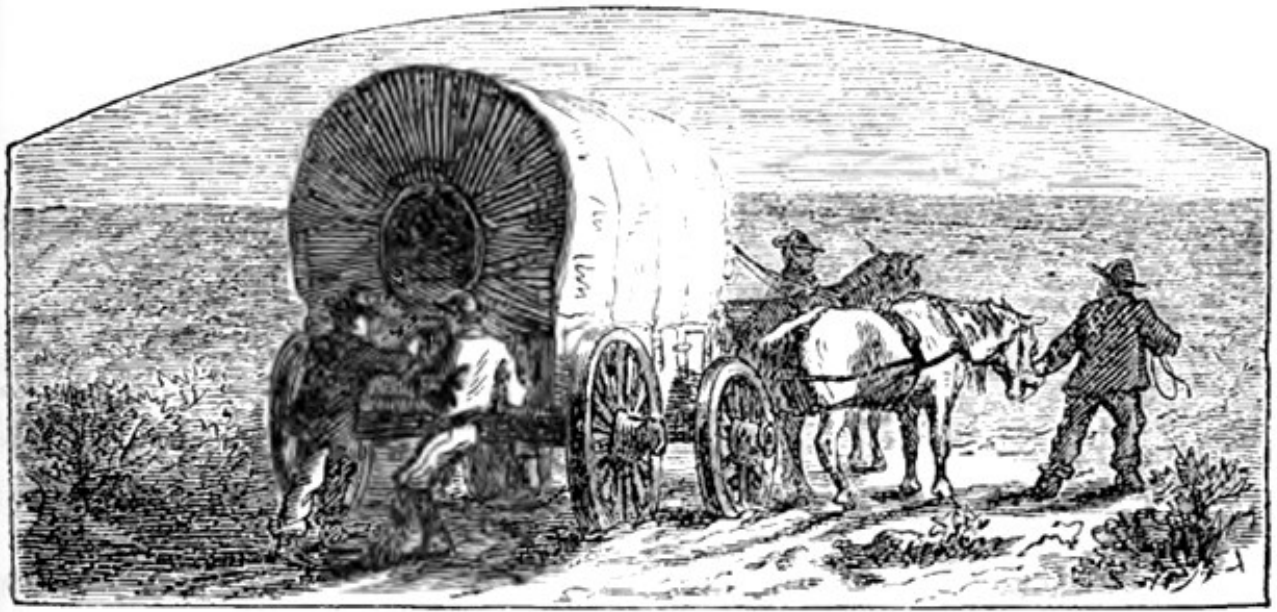

Andrew and Maria's next child Lewis Pearce was born 4/19/1843 in Napoleon Ohio.

Therefore, Andrew moved to Ohio between 1840 and 1843.

I estimate 1841.



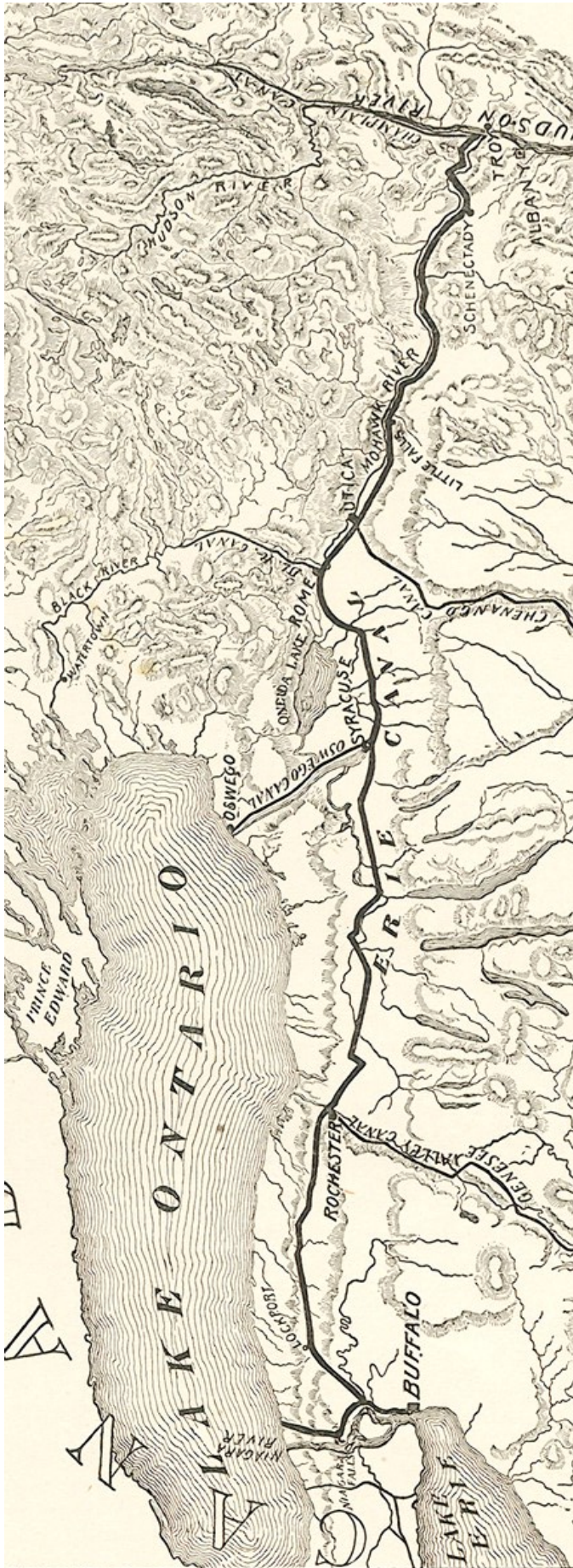
Did they travel by wagon train? Possibly some. They could have also used the railroad connection, built in 1841, from New York, then Erie Canal barge from Albany to Buffalo to Cleveland Ohio.

## Erie Canal—363 miles

“The success of the Erie Canal started a canal-building boom during the late 1820s and 1830s.

Canals were advantageous because they reduced shipping costs significantly: **costs dropped** from approximately 30 cents a ton per mile in 1820, to 2 or 3 cents a ton per mile in 1830.

The opening of canals and the canal system had the immediate effect of stimulating the economic growth of previously underserved or unreachable land-locked areas.

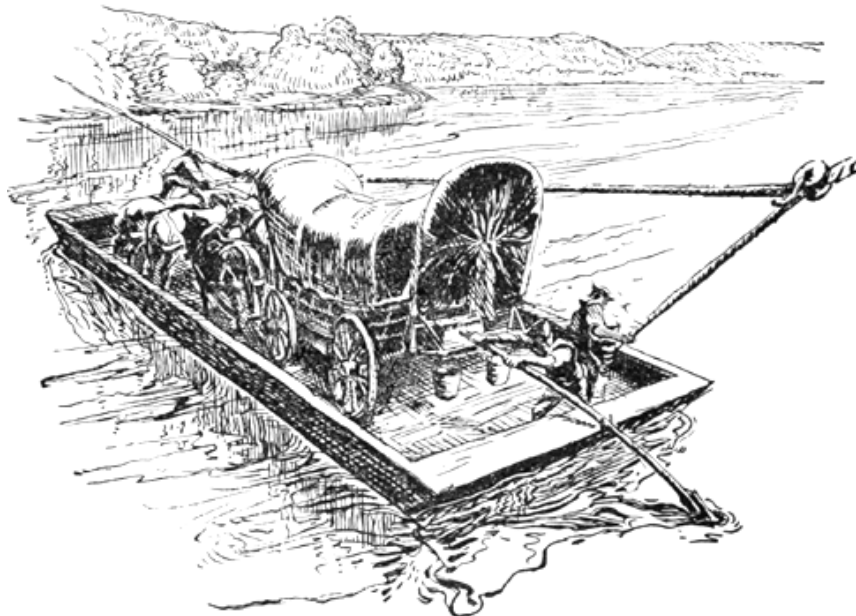
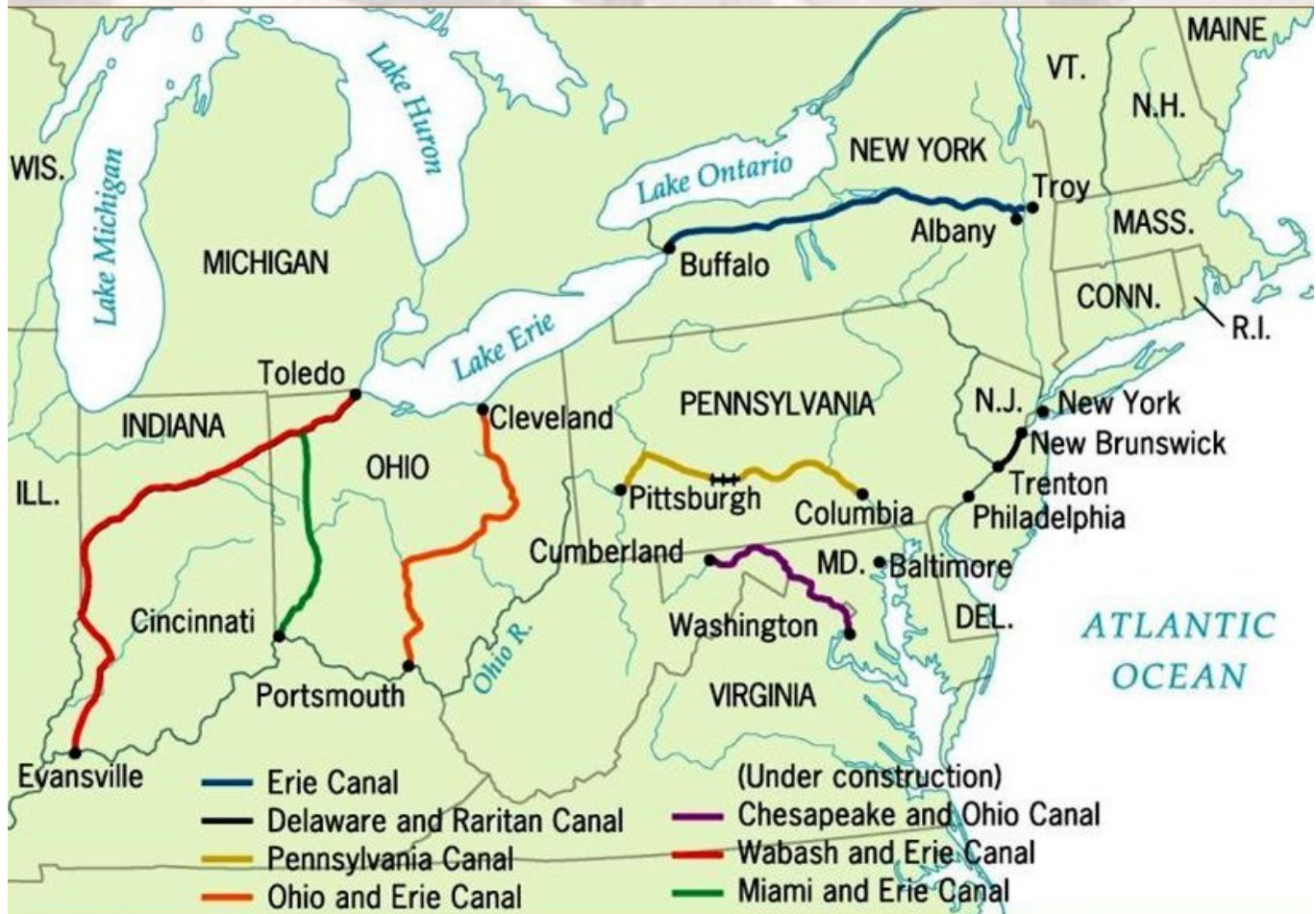
But when an economic depression hit in 1837, plans to build new, costly canals were scrapped. It was at this time when the railroad was primed to come of age.”

*Westward ho!—A House Travel.*—We were struck yesterday afternoon with the queer appearance of an emigrant's "outfit," which went by our office on its westward way. Upon the running part of an ordinary wagon, with rather a long reach, was constructed a cabin, well-roofed and clap-boarded, with curtained windows—while a stove-pipe protruding through the roof betokened that appliances and means for warmth and cookery were not lacking—the apparent comfort and snugness of the whole arrangement forming an agreeable contrast with the hardships usually encountered by the venturesome pioneer to western wilds

This non-descript dwelling was drawn by three horses, driven very conveniently from within, and thus sheltered from the inclement elements, the enterprising emigrant, while sitting by his own fire, with all his household gods around him, was pushing onward to the new home he had chosen, with scarcely a deprivation, while in *transitu*, of the comforts of the one he had left behind him.—*Buff. Com. of Wednesday.*

**Napoleon OH** was founded in 1832, located in upper West area of Ohio, 6 square miles. For comparison, Fairfield NJ is 10 square miles. 1841 Napoleon population 350; 2024 8,800.

“It was named after the famous French military and political leader, Napoleon Bonaparte. The city became a hub for trade and commerce due to its convenient location along the Maumee River and the historic Miami and Erie Canal. “ (Aparna Patel, 10/2/2023)

Ohio is named after the Iroquois word Ohi-yo, which means “great river.”

Once in Ohio, Maria had 2 more children for a total of 7.



Five major early nineteenth-century migration routes into Ohio were:

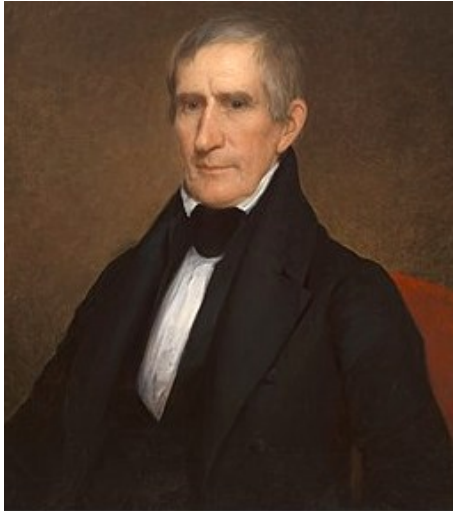
1. by Lake Erie's shores and on Lake Erie ←
2. across western Pennsylvania
3. through southeastern Ohio to Marietta and up the Muskingum River
4. through southcentral Ohio and up the Scioto River
5. into Cincinnati and up the Great and Little Miami rivers.

Car distance is 568 miles from Pine Brook NJ to Napoleon OH.



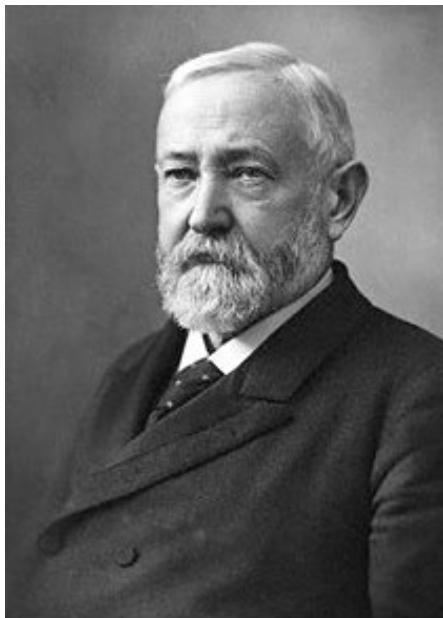
Did the 1841 Andrew Edward Pearce family travel by railroad North to Albany NY, then Buffalo, then Lake Erie? Or did they go South to Philly and then West?



**William H. Harrison**

During the 1841 travel, Whig President **William Henry Harrison** died after only 32 days in office. He died 4/4/1841 from pneumonia. He was the 9th US President.

Vice President **John Tyler** succeeded Harrison as the 10th US President. They had run a presidential ticket called 'Tippecanoe and Tyler too'.



**Benjamin Harrison**

Interestingly, his grandson **Benjamin Harrison** became our 23rd President in 1889. He was a Republican.

During the Civil War, Benjamin was a soldier in General Sherman's "**March to the Sea**", Much like our Edward Pearce and Albert Pearce.

Andrew owned **80 acres** in Napoleon Ohio, of which 32 were a plowed farm **section 22**, costing \$1.85 per acre.



Andrew Pearce probably received an Ohio land grant from the federal General Land Office . “Those dated 1841-1844 are signed by President John Tyler (1841-1845). President William Henry Harrison’s (1841) signature does not appear on any documents, due in part to his short tenure (32 days) as President. The Land Grant enabled individuals to purchase public domain land from the government through credit or installment systems.” (2016 University of Chicago Library)

“In 1820, prices and farm sizes were reduced until **80 acres** could be purchased at \$1.25 per acre from the US government.”

“Northern Ohio drew many settlers by way of **Lake Erie** from New England and New York.” (2012 article by The International Institute for Genealogical Studies)

Ten years later, 1851, Andrew’s nephew **Israel Crane Pearce** would also leave New Jersey for Ohio. He lived in three cities in Ohio: 1851-54 Granville, 1855-1888 Jersey and Circleville.

Israel worked as a traveling notions salesman via horse and a red wagon named the 'Red Bird'. The kids would shout at him, 'I see Pierce', which is a play on words of his initials. Jersey, Ohio was settled by many people from the Caldwell, NJ area.

Once in Ohio, Maria bore 2 more children, Lewis and Albert Pierce, for a total of 7.

Maria would have the opposite children as her parents; 6 boys and 1 girl. From 1842 to 1848, Andrew Edward Pearce worked his 80-acre Napoleon Ohio farm.

The **1850** Napoleon OH census shows Mrs. Maria Low Pearce with her 6 children ages 3 to 19 along with her brother Henry N. Low. Her husband Andrew Edward Pearce died 1848. I hope to find the farm location.

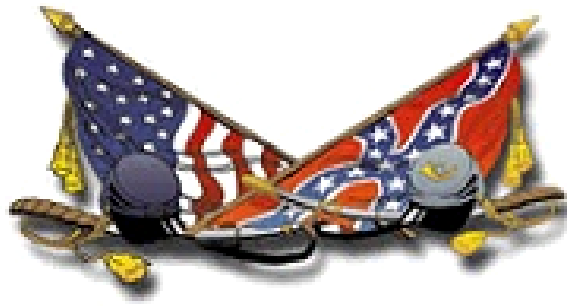

The winds of war came on **4/12/1861**. When the War of Rebellion started, Maria was age 51, Josiah 30, Joseph 27, Louise 26, Edward 21, Lewis 18 and Albert 15. A 7th child had died in 1838 age 1.



Maria's only daughter **Louise Pearce** age 26 married **6/22/1861** to **William Simpson** age 28 in Napoleon Ohio. Her brother Edward gave the bride away since her father had died 13 years earlier. It appears that William joined the Union Army in 1860, before the war started.

During the war, William Simpson made Sergeant in **Ohio 100th** regiment company B, **same regiment** as **Edward Pearce**. William was 5 years older than brother-in-law Edward Pearce. I don't know what became of William M. Simpson or Louise Pearce.

Four months later on 10/24/1861, **Joseph Henry Pearce** enlisted in the **Ohio 68th** regiment company D.



William and Louise Pearce Simpson were married 6/22/1861 in Napoleon Ohio. Her brother Edward Pearce gave the bride away.

It was a short honeymoon. Days later, William and Edward of the Ohio 100th regiment were off to war.

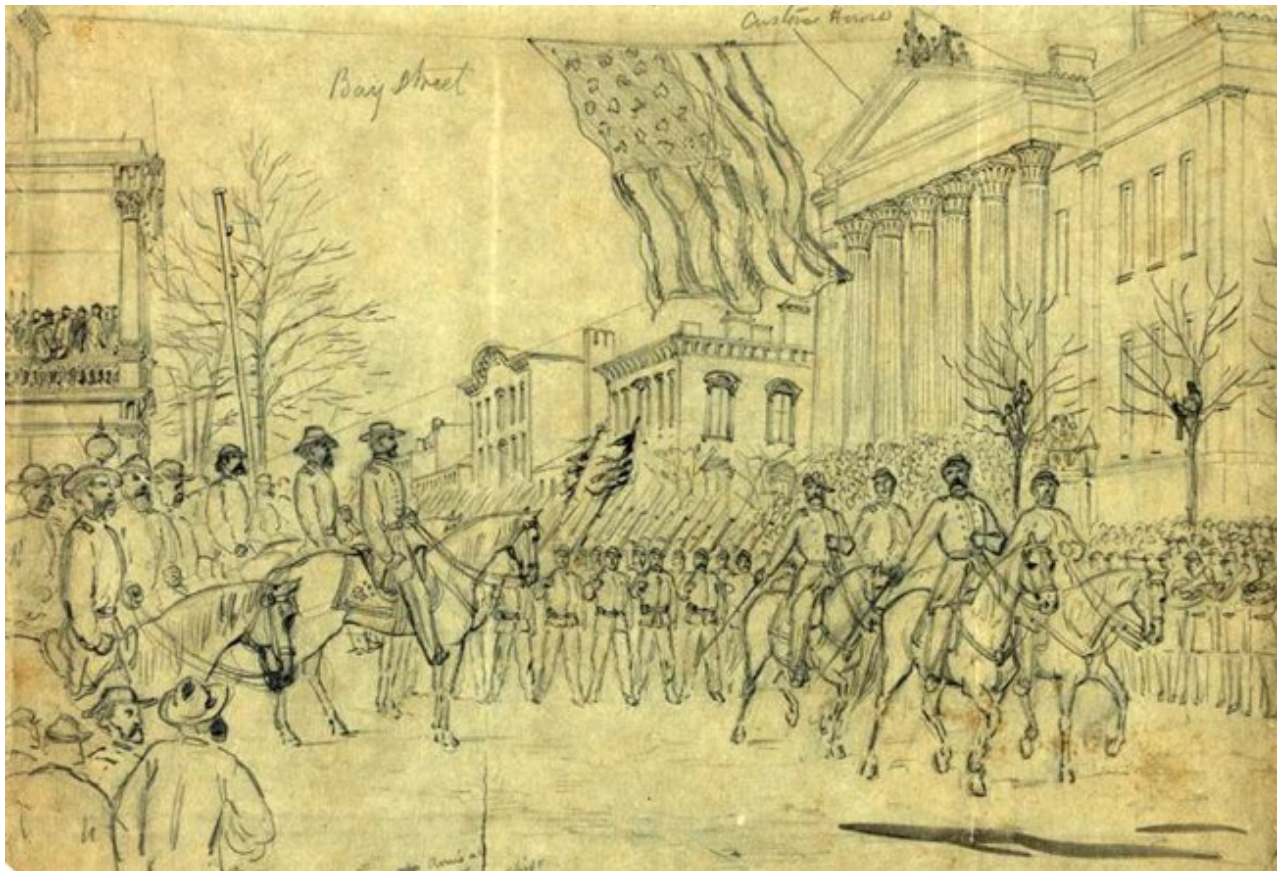

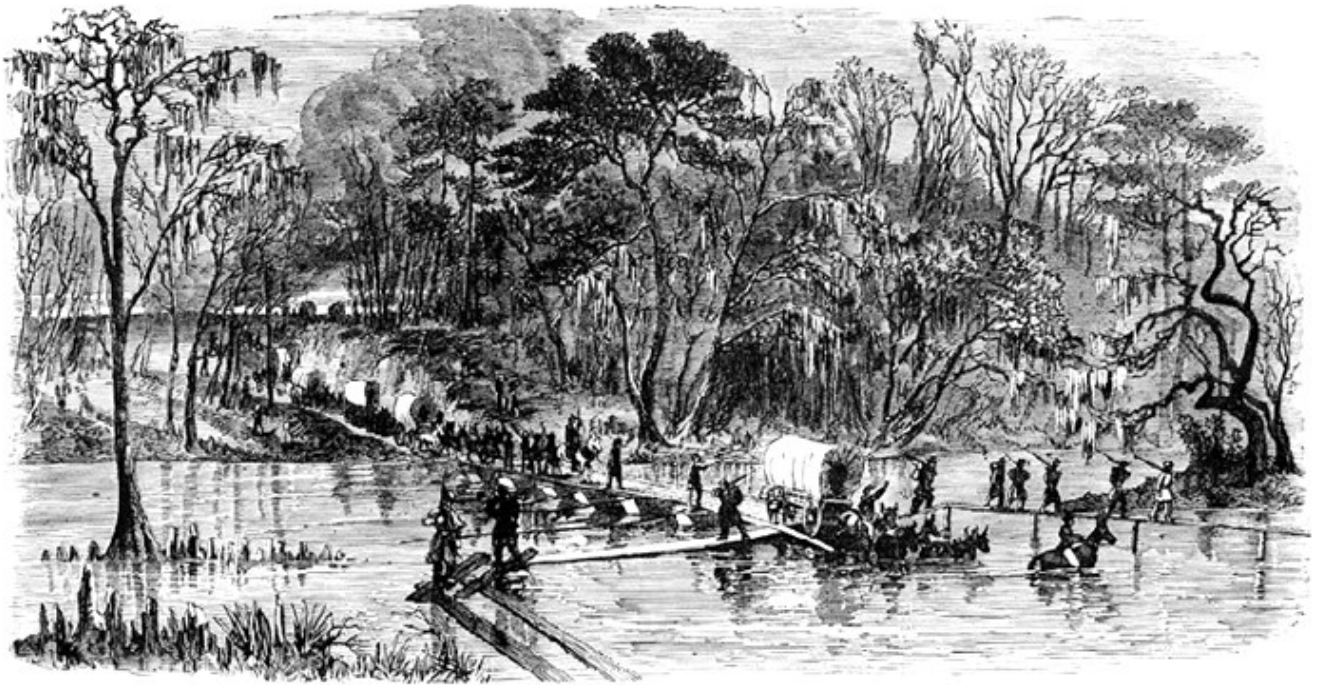

2/9/1865 **March to the Sea.** Walking North. **Albert Pearce** crossing the South Edisto River, South Carolina on Pontoons at Bennaker Bridge with General William Sherman's 17th Corps.

(Frank Leslie Weekly Magazine, 1896, by Editor **John Young Foster**, friend of our Joseph Condit Baldwin).

**5/17/1865** 10 pm NY Times: “The advance of General Sherman’s army was expected to go into camp near **Falls Church Virginia** this evening. The General himself has not yet arrived in the city.”

The Union Army is marching North towards Washington DC.



Edward Pearce of the Ohio 100th and brother Albert Pearce of the Ohio 68th were both at the **Big Shanty Battle** at Kennesaw Georgia.

Edward received a glancing gunshot to his left cheek which left a permanent scar.

7/13/1865: **Albert Pearce** of the Ohio 68th is finally home. He was officially discharged 7/10/1865.

I wonder if Albert knew that mother Maria had died 22 days earlier on 6/21/1865.

I imagine that his 1863 deceased brother **Joseph Henry Pearce**, also of the Ohio 68th, is buried in Vicksburg, Mississippi.

### Arrival of the 68th, 55th and 124th Ohio Regiments.

In accordance with our announcement yesterday two regiments of Ohio soldiers arrived this morning. About half past eight one of our fine city bands came marching up Water and Superior streets to the Public Square at the head of the 68th Ohio regiment, 478 men, under command of Lieut. Colonel G. E. Wells. The 68th was organized at Napoleon, Henry county, and is principally from Northwestern counties. It went to the field under command of the gallant Colonel STEEDMAN. The 68th has been at Louisville, Ky., for the past few weeks and left for Camp Cleveland yesterday, arriving over the O., C. & O. Road. It is officered as follows:

Lieut. Colonel—Geo. E. Wells.  
Major—Arthur E. Crockett.  
Adjutant—Henry Welty.  
Surgeon—J. E. Bigham.

These two regiments in the order we have designated marched up to the Public Square where the formality of welcoming them was completed and they sat down to an elegant breakfast, after which they marched over to Camp to await final discharge.

4 of the 5 Pearce sons returned to Napoleon Ohio by 1865.  
Patriotic UNION soldiers all.

**Josiah Pearce** age 30 in 1861, per 1860 census.

**Joseph Henry Pearce** age 27 enlisted 10/21/1861, killed at the 1863 Grand Gulf Mississippi Battle.

**Edward W. Pearce** age 21 enlisted 10/24/1861 came home with a permanent scar on his left cheek from a glancing bullet at the 1864 Shanty Georgia Battle. He married 8 months after the war, 12/21/1865, to Mittie Keyes. They moved to Hamilton, Missouri and had 10 children. He lived to age 68 in 1909.

**Albert Pearce**, age 17 enlisted 11/28/1863, marched with General Sherman's 1864-1865 "**March to the Sea**" thru Georgia and the Carolina's. After the war, he had "disease of the kidneys" and "partial insanity". He was placed in the Dayton Ohio Soldiers Home in 1871, dying a few months later age 25.

**Lewis Pearce** age 21 enlisted 5/2/1864, moved 1868 to LaSalle Michigan. He had chronic kidney and eye disease. He received \$18 monthly 1914 pension, then \$21 in 1918, then \$30 in 1920. He died single in **1921** age 77 with \$250 debts and no funeral arrangements. He proudly paid off his Michigan home the year before.

A Michigan lawyer found a Bible in Lewis' room with family names and dates. Lewis was the last in his family. The lawyer could not find a Lewis Pearce relative to pass down the Bible.



7/14/1865 Friday. The Ohio 68th arrived yesterday.

If any of our readers have forgotten the career of the 68th, we will jog their memory by reciting the names of the battles they have fought, as they are inscribed on the regimental banner:

Fort Donelson, Shiloh, Siege of Corinth, Iuka, Matamora, Thompson's Hills, Raymond, Jackson, Champion Hills, Fort Hill, Vicksburgh, Monroe Raid, Bayou Chitto, Meridian Raid, Big Shanty, Bushy Mountain, Kennesaw, Nick-Jack, Siege of Atlanta, Atlanta, July 21st, Atlanta, July 22d, Atlanta, July 28th, Jonesboro, Lovejoy, Mill-edgeville, Savannah, Pocotaligo, Salkehatchie, Orangeburg, Charleston, Columbia, Cheraw, Bentonville, and Raleigh.

After the battle of Corinth this regiment was merged in the 17th corps, under General McPherson. That able officer was killed within thirty rods of the **68th**.

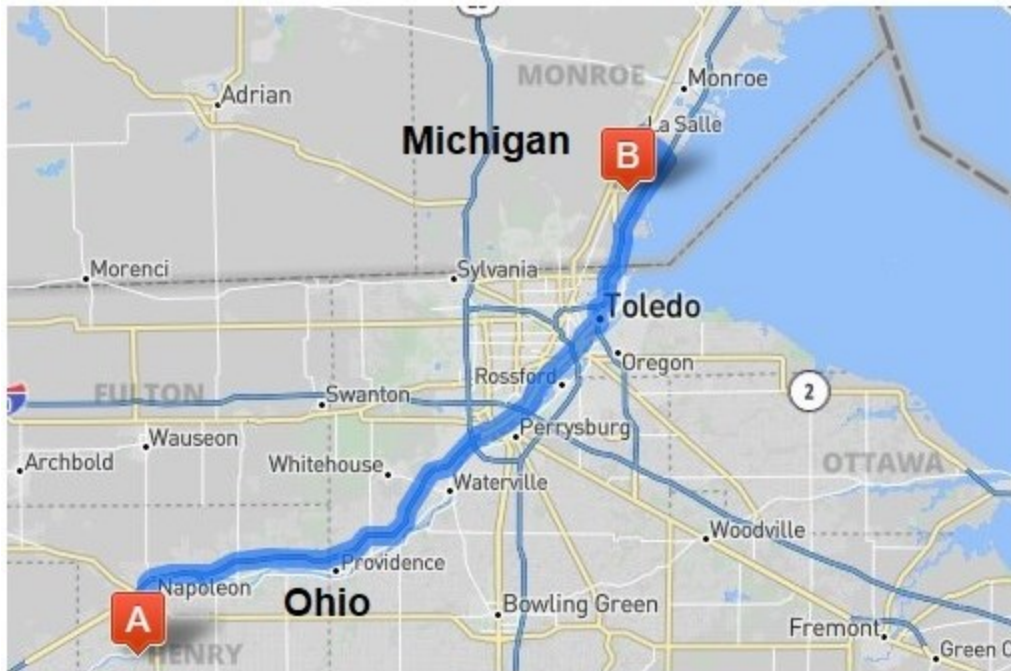
The boys have made as fine a record as those of any regiment in the service. They return 478 in number, leaving many a comrade sleeping in the sunny South.

Our Joseph Pearce is one of the comrades buried in the South. Likely, a mass grave.

**Lewis Pearce** was 5-6 height, light complexion, blue eyes, never married. In 1868, moved 58 miles from Napoleon OH to La Salle Michigan.

In 1841, Andrew Pearce age 35 and Maria age 31 left Pine Brook NJ for a better farming life in Napoleon Ohio. Andrew died 7 years later and Maria ran the farm for 13 more years. The family worked hard.

Then came the Civil War. They gave **5 men** to the Union Army to help keep America whole. With Andrew and the boys gone, Maria and Louisa were left alone to do the farm activities.

It is not known if all the 4 sons and brother in law arrived home by **6/21/1865**.

Tragically, Maria died Wednesday **6/21/1865** age 54 in Napoleon Ohio, 2 months after the war ended in 4/9/1865.

The children moved and the farm dream ended. I don't know where they were buried.

Josiah Pearce may or may not be the fellow who moved to Indiana and then Great Forks North Dakota (I think it is the wrong fellow).

Louisa Pearce Simpson's life after the war unknown.

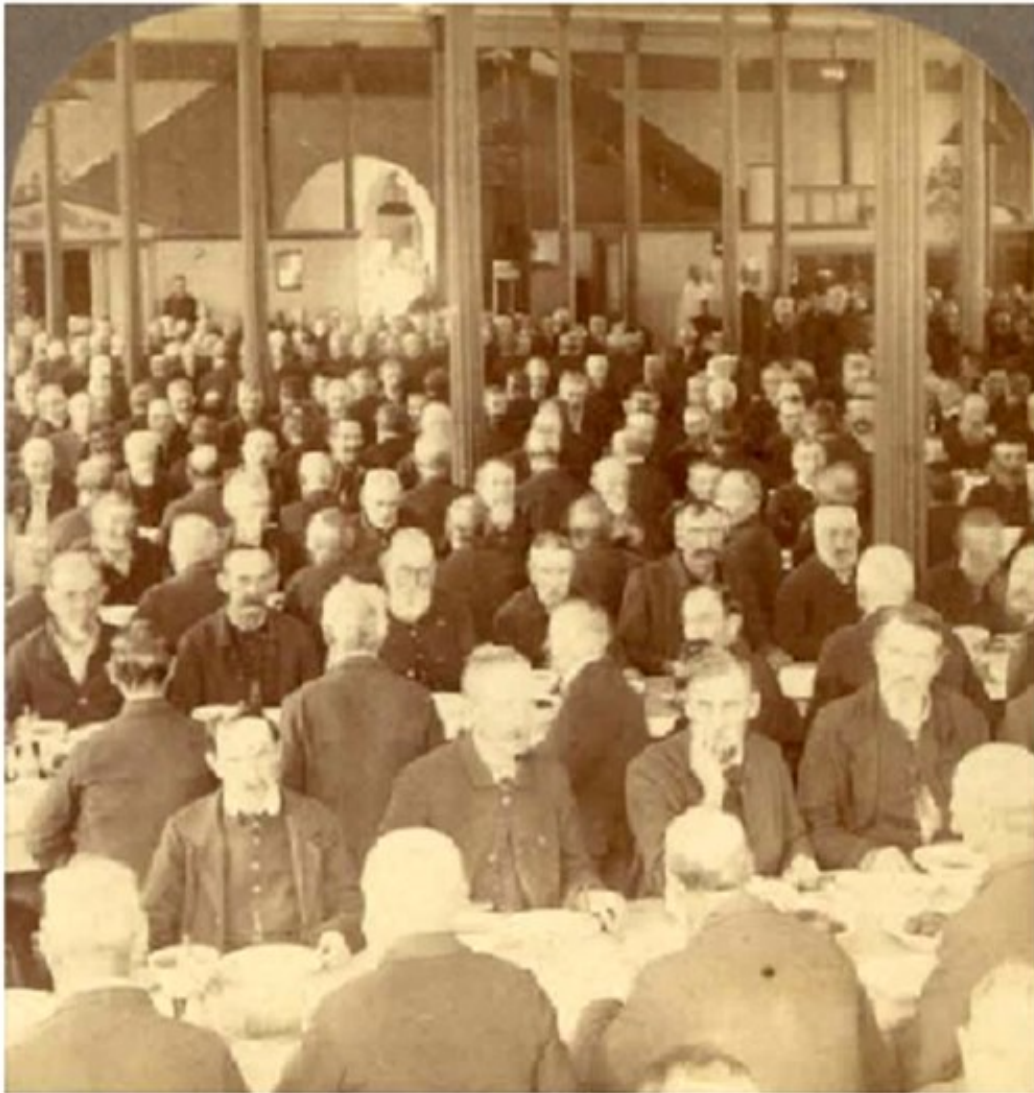

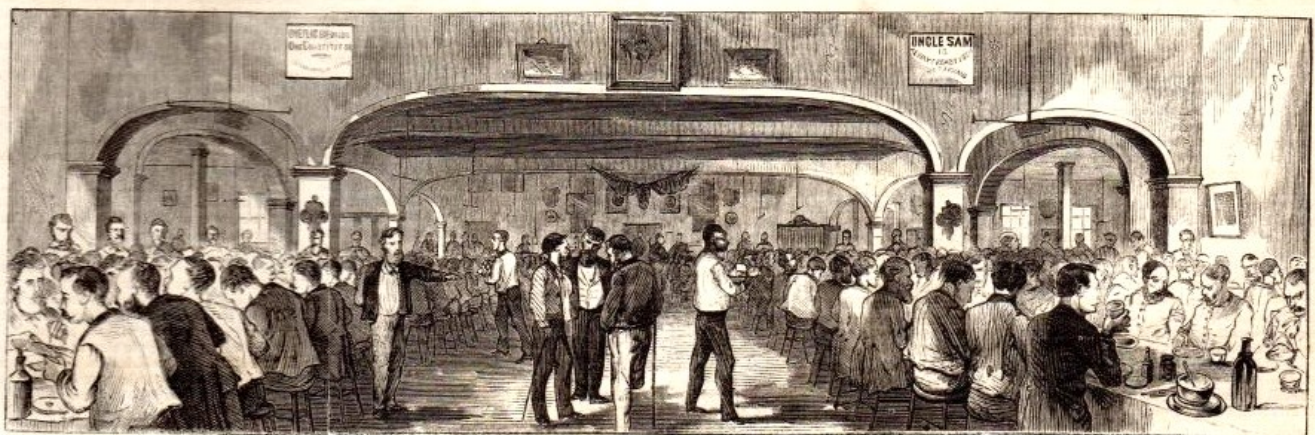

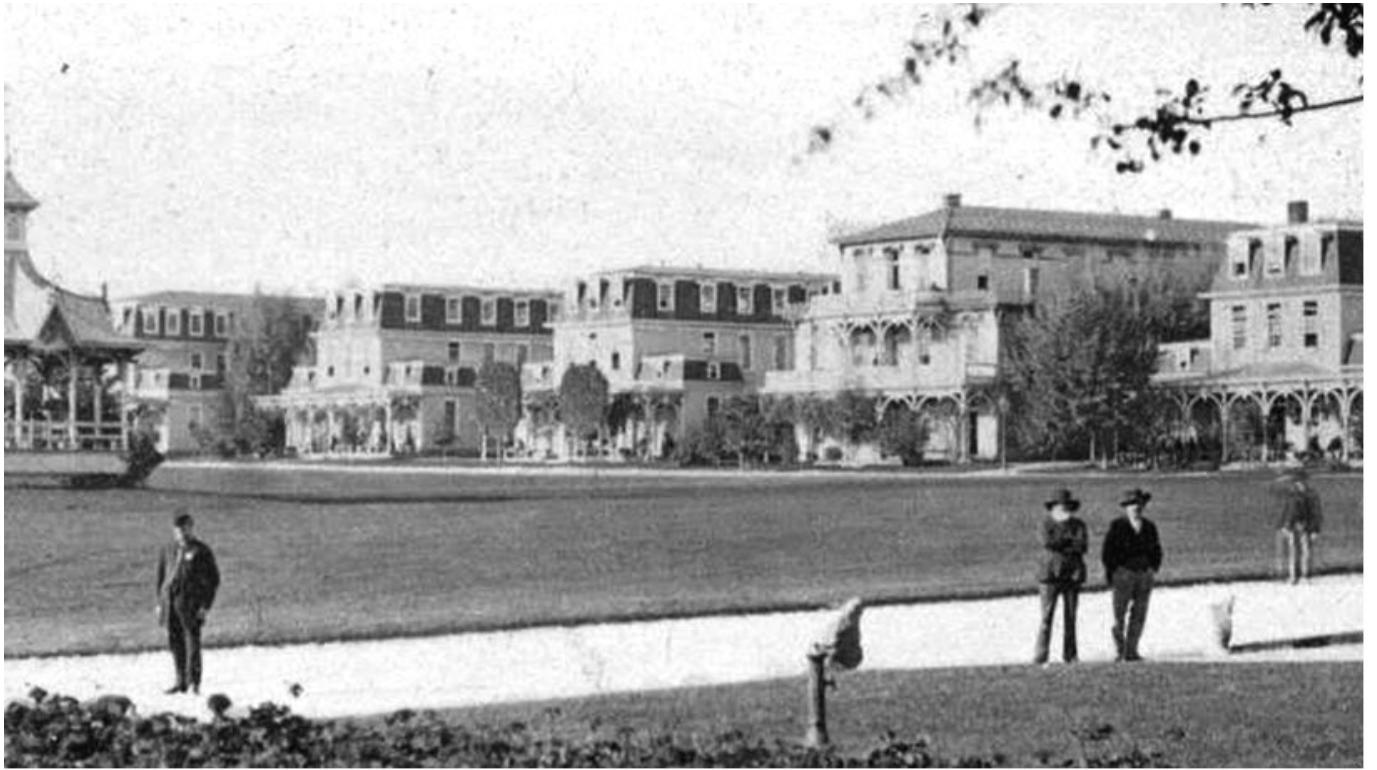
